

Latin America


554 hospitals, 71 health care facilities, 40 health systems and 15 organizations, representing the interests of 1,840 hospitals and health centers.

Africa

59 hospitals, 20 health care facilities, 6 health systems and 3 Organization, representing the interests of 1,590 hospitals and health centers.

109 hospitals, 4 health care facilities, 10 health systems and 31 organizations, representing the interests of 13,571 hospitals and health centers.

Pacific

POLICY FRAMEWORK: DIRECTIVE 2014/24/EU

- Give public authorities the power to include environmental and social criteria when procuring products and services – linked to the subject matter
- Encourage public authorities to strategically use procurement to:
 - > Obtain better value for taxpayers money
 - Contribute to a more innovative, sustainable, inclusive and competitive economy
- Move towards value-based (as opposed to price-based)
 procurement
- Promote a circular economy





SUSTAINABILITY CONCEPTS

- Most Economically Advantageous Tender (MEAT) is a costeffectiveness approach that also considers sustainability elements from any stage of the product/service lifecycle and not just the sustainability of materials.
- **Lifecycle costing** includes the lifecycle costs of works, supplies, or services when considering the price.
- Require specific environmental and social labels (and equivalents)
 as award criteria and technical performance requirements.
